New Area Pregnancy Center Opens!

CROSSROADS PREGNANCY CENTER held a ribbon cutting ceremony on October 29 at the new Altoona office at 212 Frankstown Rd. The faith-based, nonprofit organization provides free and confidential services to women and families in the Altoona area, and also has offices in Huntingdon, Mifflin and Juniata counties.

Crossroads provides free medical services including pregnancy testing, limited ultrasounds for confirmation of pregnancy and STI testing and treatment for chlamydia and gonorrhea.

Crossroads clinic is licensed with the state of Pennsylvania and offers life-affirming peer counseling on options.

There are also classes for new parents on pregnancy, parenting, child care, life skills and more. In exchange for completing a class, clients receive a "point" that can be exchanged for material items such as cribs, car seats, diapers and other items.





Other services provided free of charge are mentoring for new fathers, sexual integrity classes, post-abortion healing and support.

Legislative Update

Lawmakers in PA want to turn back the clock on legal protections for preborn children and their mothers By Maria V. Gallagher, Legislative Director Pennsylvania Pro-Life Federation

The Pennsylvania General Assembly was truly ahead of its time back in 1989 when

it passed the Pennsylvania Abortion Control Act.

This landmark law was an omnibus measure which included protections for preborn babies in the later stages of pregnancy...parental consent... informed consent...a 24-hour waiting period for abortions...and protections against sex selection abortions.

The law became the basis of the U.S. Supreme Court decision *Planned Parenthood v. Casey* in 1992. The High Court upheld most of the provisions of the Act, striking a spousal notification provision. The Court's decision ushered in an era when states were able to pass meaningful protections for preborn babies, even in light of the 1973 ruling *Roe v. Wade*, which legalized abortion in all 50 states.

With the High Court's 2022 *Dobbs* decision, we have entered the post-*Roe* era. Sadly, however, some lawmakers in Pennsylvania want to turn back the clock on legal protections for preborn children and their mothers.

A co-sponsorship memo is circulating for a bill that would repeal the Abortion Control Act entirely and replace it with something called the Bodily Autonomy Act. The proposal would wipe out common sense abortion restrictions which are supported by a vast majority of the public.

At a time when *Roe* has finally been relegated to the ash heap of history, pregnant women and their babies in Pennsylvania face new legal threats.

This is why it is imperative that we educate people about the wisdom of protective laws such as the Abortion Control Act.

Action Item: If you live in Pennsylvania, please urge your state representative to oppose the so-called Bodily Autonomy Act.

Looking ahead to the "landscape of abortion"

Kate Zernike is one of the many *New York Times* reporters whose beat includes abortion. Aided by colleague Ruth Graham, she produced "The New Landscape of the Abortion Fight" for the [December 10] *Times*.

With the mid-term elections complete and Congress approaching adjournment, this no doubt seemed like a good time to write an overview.

Of course, much of the beginning focuses on the ballot initiatives swept by pro-abortionists on November 8. Pro-abortion forces are eyeballing additional states but, as Zernike points out, "ballot initiatives aren't an option in every state."

Where then? "The path to restoring abortion rights still runs largely through state legislatures, where it has traditionally been harder to mobilize voters and donors." So if it is true, as Zernike writes, there were additional pockets of voters last month, what does it mean going forward?

For James Bopp Jr., general counsel of the National Right to Life, a net gain in people voting "doesn't mean a change in the abortion issue," he said.

"In every state I've seen—and I've seen 30 or 40—the Republicans picked up seats in their statehouse and state senate," he added. "So, if it was true there was some kind of abortion rights wave, it would have caught all these people. There's no real evidence that there was a net benefit, or you would have seen the opposite of victories for Republicans in every state."






A typical antiquated attitude of the modern-day feminist is that women are incapable of a successful career if they become mothers.



Abortion: A Physician's Story

As many of you know or can at least tell by my Facebook page, I am not one to "post" much and generally consider myself a non-Facebooker. Since first learning about the new legislative laws being passed on abortion in New York, I was immediately reminded of a wise friend's words, to me, five years ago as she urged me to make "my story" public. She stated that prior to hearing about my experience, she knew very little about what actually happens in an abortion and believed that most people do not understand and likely do not even think much about the actual abortive procedure.

She strongly felt that everyone should be made aware of what actually happens in an abortion and that only through education can there be change. At the time, I shrugged it off. I did not grow up in the United States and try to stay out of politics and social media as much as possible. But I do have a story: a story that still makes me feel sick and want to cry, 8 years later. I am not sure it will make a difference or even be read by more than just my family and friends, but that is no reason to not speak out.

I was in my 3rd year of medical school in Beer Sheva, Israel and was excited to be starting my obstetrician and gynecology rotation at Soroka Medical Center. One day, we were told that we would be rotating through several clinical exam rooms to experience the various "fields" of OB/GYN.

I was switching with my classmates to enter a room where a "procedure" was taking place. There was a pregnant lady lying on a standard OB/GYN exam bed who was apparently consciously sedated. Next to her was an ultrasound machine and I smiled as I saw a baby about 17 weeks gestation floating peacefully in its amniotic sack, it's tiny heart beat flickering on the monitor screen.

I still had no idea what the "procedure" was until suddenly I saw a long pointed object come into the triangular view of the ultrasound monitor and I watched in horror as the "tool" suddenly jabbed straight at the little baby. The baby immediately jolted violently as it reacted to the pain of the stab. I could not move: I felt paralyzed, dumbfounded.

I remember thinking, "This mother needs to wake up and see what they are doing to her baby! She needs to know!" The stabs kept coming and the baby continued to reel, its little arms and legs flailing and punching in the amniotic fluid as it fought to survive. It felt like an eternity but finally the movement stopped. The stabs kept coming, but the life was gone and the struggle was over. The little hands that only moments earlier seemed to wave at me from the ultrasound monitor were severed off!

Bit by bit, the baby was cut into indistinguishable pieces of tissue and the skull was crushed. Next came the vacuum, and as the doctor who performed the "procedure" pulled out the pieces of conception, I heard him chuckle. He turned to us, and with a grin I will never forget, he held up one of those tiny, perfect hands with forceps and reached it out to each of us saying, "high five, high five," and laughed each time! I looked at him with disbelief!

After my shock wore off I asked why the mother had chosen to have an abortion and he replied with a shrug that he was not sure, but said if he remembered right, she had possibly been exposed to a varicella zoster (the chicken

pox), and therefore wanted an abortion. He shrugged again, then under his breath, he said, "you know, everyone needs their excuse," and left the room.

I have no idea what that young mother was going through or her reasons for wanting an abortion. I have no idea what she was told about abortion or if she had the procedure explained to her in any detail. I do not write this to judge or condemn this mother or any other mother. I only want to create awareness because I want to believe that if that mother was awake and was able to see her little baby waving to her from the monitor—if she saw the long "tool" and knew that was about to stab her baby to pieces—that she would never have chosen to abort her baby.

I understand this is not always the way babies are aborted, and often, at earlier gestations, chemicals are used. You could argue that chemicals are a more humane way, but even Hitler used "humaneness" to calmly kill Jews in gas chambers. The arguments about when a life is a life are meaningless to me: that day I witnessed a baby literally fighting for its

meaningless to me: that day I witnessed a baby literally fighting for its life, reacting to the jabs of death just like any "live" person would.

I do not claim to be political. I am neither a Democrat nor a Republican, as I do not like to be boxed in to any belief system and instead prefer to form my own. On one hand I am entirely against abortion in any form (with the exception of the extremely rare cases that you can ask me about), yet I also strongly believe in the necessity of social service programs to help that mother and her new baby. More than anything, I am pro-life and believe that the little baby I saw stabbed to death that day had a right to say no!

... Abortion is a "monstrosity"

His adult critics respond with ad hominem attacks By Dave Andrusko

The writer of this particular letter to the editor described himself as a Boy Scout who was "going to be sharing with you my views and ideas about abortion."



And did he ever!

"In my opinion, abortion is a monstrosity—ending a life without the child's choice," he wrote. "It's destroying the future for a life that hasn't had the chance to live."

There were only two responses, initially, both from the same guy. Snarky,

smarter-than-thou, just what you would expect from a pro-abortionist mocking a kid for writing about "ending a life without the child's choice."

Pshaw, the pro-abort responded. "Human children don't get to make choices until about three years old," as if he didn't understand the young man was making the point that the child's life was taken away by someone else—unjustly and brutally—a "monstrosity" if ever there was one.

A couple of hours later, two others piled on (one, like the first pro-abort, took two runs). Even meaner, even more beside the point.

But what irritated them was that the Boy Scout was stating an undeniable truth in a straightforward, uncynical way: abortion takes away a child's future. None of the three (presumably adult) responders addressed that—instead relying on juvenile ad hominem attacks.

- 14,977 paid staff (25 percent of whom are licensed medical professionals)
- 53,855 volunteers (12 percent of whom are licensed medical professionals)
- 10,215 licensed medical professionals involved as pregnancy center workers (paid staff and volunteers combined)
- Exceptional Client Satisfaction—Consistently high client satisfaction rates reported to pregnancy centers reflect that women, men, and youth who visit centers feel respected, valued, and well cared for.[4] Client satisfaction reported to two national networks in 2019 continues to validate excellence in care at affiliated pregnancy centers around the country. At Care Net affiliated pregnancy centers on average per center, 99.19 percent of clients/ patients who completed a written survey indicated that their overall experience at the center was positive. One network has noted the "satisfaction rating is higher than that of Netflix, Chipotle, and the iPhone." Heartbeat International affiliated centers equally reported positive client satisfaction of 99.6 percent on average per center through client exit surveys. This accounts for about 2,100 pregnancy centers.

Who Values Pregnancy Center Work?

Federal and state governments recognize and value the impactful work of pregnancy centers. State health departments actively refer to pregnancy care centers in at least 20 states. [5] State-level resolutions honoring pregnancy centers have been passed in at least 21 states. [6] Centers are recipients of some government monies through "Choose Life" license plates in at least 29 states and the District of Columbia, state-funded or TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) block grants funds in at least 8 states, Alternatives to Abortion state funds in 13 states, Sexual Risk Avoidance grant monies, and limited Medicaid reimbursement in 17 states [7]—but at least 90 percent of funding for pregnancy centers is raised locally at the community level and more than 80 percent of centers receive no government funding at all. [8]

Under Attack

Pregnancy centers have been under attack by pro-abortion advocates since first opening their doors. A 2015 California law, dubbed the Reproductive "FACT" Act, which forced life-affirming pregnancy centers to display information, including a phone number, on how women can obtain a free or low-cost abortion, was struck down as unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court in 2019. The Supreme Court ruling was a victory for free speech protections. Similar laws in Maryland, New York and Texas have been found unconstitutional at the federal court level. Pervasive attacks against pregnancy centers in academia have increased over the past decade. Efforts to demonstrate and validate the essential, highly valuable and impactful care provided at centers remain vitally important to protect the life-saving work they do.

High standards in care have become a centerpiece of pregnancy center services. Affiliates of the three largest national networks (Care Net, Heartbeat International, and NIFLA), as well as eight other networks, provide ongoing training, resources, and/or services subject to an overarching national code of ethics instituted in 2009, "Our Commitment of Care and Competence" (CCC), recently updated in 2019.^[9]

The code provides that all medical services be under the supervision and direction of a licensed physician in accordance with applicable medical standards. The code also addresses truthfulness in all communications; client information confidentiality; rigor in screening volunteers and staff, nondiscrimination, a consistent life ethic, and kindness to and compassion for clients. Compliance with all legal requirements regarding employment, fundraising, financial management, taxation, public reporting, and financial disclosure are also included in the code. Pregnancy centers maintain strict confidentiality protections as guided by federal, state, and local law.

Other pregnancy center parent organizations, even if not officially recognizing the CCC, require their affiliates to abide by high standards of care which prioritize integrity in client care, a consistent life ethic, and adherence to legal and regulatory guidelines.^[10]

Summary


Pro-life pregnancy centers in the U.S. providing essential and professional care are now over 50 years old. [11] They are model, community-based organizations found in virtually every type of community—rural, urban, suburban, college settings, even as mobile medical units—across the country. The multitude of medical, education, and support services pregnancy centers provided to women, men, youth and babies are evidence of the impact and measurable good centers are achieving. The growing cadre of licensed medical professionals as staff and volunteers involved at pregnancy centers now number over 10,200 in 2,132 centers and are emblematic of their medical success. The nearly 54,000 volunteers at centers nationwide reflect investment by citizens and professionals who esteem the work being done.

In addition, referral to a community provider or the direct provision of abortion pill reversal (APR) at pregnancy centers gives "tangible hope" to women who regret starting the chemical abortion process and seek to stop it. Expanded outreach for victims of human trafficking, clients challenged with opioid addiction, and women and men struggling with past abortion experiences through after-abortion support and recovery efforts are examples of the ways pregnancy centers in the U.S. are meeting critical needs of people in their communities and helping to provide hope and healing. [12]

Then there was what Mr. Bopp called the "enormous net benefit" to the anti-abortion side: Republicans took control of the U.S. House of Representatives—if only narrowly. Had Democrats held their majority, they would have continued to try to pass the Women's Health Protection Act, which would guarantee a nationwide right to abortion. "They were going to go for the stake in the heart," Mr. Bopp said.


He expects that Republican-controlled legislatures will continue to pass laws like one adopted in Indiana this summer banning abortion except in cases of rape or incest, or to save the life of the pregnant woman.

In some ways, pro-abortion forces agreed with Bopp. For now, however, the midterms did little to make abortion more available to the 34 million women of reproductive age who live in states that have prohibited it since *Roe* was overturned. Additional states have restricted it early in pregnancy. Ms. Standiford, of Planned Parenthood, said: "Before the election, there were 18 states with abortion bans in effect; after the election, there were 18 states with abortion bans in effect."

Looking forward, let's add more states with widespread protective laws.



Pro-Life Pregnancy Centers Helped Two Million People Provided \$266 Million to Help Women—In Just One Year

Pro-life pregnancy centers (formerly known as crisis pregnancy centers and also as pregnancy care or resource centers) are faith-based, community-based, not-for-profit organizations which first began to appear in the U.S. in the late 1960s, as abortion was becoming legal, to provide care and resources to assist women with immediate and ongoing needs related to unexpected pregnancy. Their focus on alternatives to abortion, also known as life-affirming services, was and is designed to empower a woman to welcome her child into the world.

Today, pregnancy centers provide an expanded range of essential and professional care encompassing support services, medical care, and resources, usually at no cost to the women, men, and youth they serve. Personalized care is provided within a respectful, compassionate, and supportive environment by trained workers/individuals.

In 2021, there are approximately 3,000 pregnancy center locations in the U.S. (counting medical mobile units as separate locations).

What Do They Do?

Provide essential and professional care to vulnerable women and youth on a free or low-cost basis typically including: pregnancy testing; options consultation (including education on parenting and adoption, parenting and child raising, and abortion); medical services (early obstetrical ultrasounds, medical exams, STD testing and treatment, and increasingly other health services); prenatal and parenting education; material assistance; sexual risk avoidance education; after-abortion recovery support; referrals for medical care; and linkages to vital community and public health resources.

Care is provided by trained workers and licensed professionals through a holistic health paradigm taking into account emotional, social, mental, spiritual as well as physical health. By providing practical assistance and links to needed resources, pregnancy centers improve health outcomes for women and promote health and well-being for themselves, their children, and their families.

What's the Impact?

Data from 2019 shows that pro-life pregnancy centers served close to two million people, with services and material assistance with a total value of over \$266 million. [2] 2019 findings for 2,700 centers in the U.S. [3]

- 8 in 10 locations (or 2,132) offer free ultrasounds
- 486,213 free ultrasounds performed
- 731,884 free pregnancy tests
- 967,251 free consultations with new clients
- 810 locations offer STD Testing
- 563 locations offer STD treatment onsite
- 291,230 clients attended Parenting and Prenatal Education Classes
- 21,698 clients attended After-Abortion Support and Recovery Sessions
- 305 locations offer Abortion Pill Reversal
- 2,525 locations offer material assistance such as baby items (including diapers, baby clothing outfits, new car seats and strollers)
- 120 Medical Mobile Units with ultrasound (at least) rolling on the road to bring services to women out in the community
